

Hungarian higher education system in general follows the Bologna process. Programmes are accredited by the Hungarian accreditation board. Course credits are transferable in all European Union member states.

The academic year at ELTE starts in September. Both semesters start with a registration period which is followed by the study period and an examination period afterwards.



ECTS credit system -

The ECTS conversion table ensures transfer procedures between the Hungarian academic credit system and the ECTS. The recognition of courses completed abroad is based on the credit transfer regulation. For incoming international students, a Transcript of Records is issued at the end of the semester, which contains the codes and titles of the completed courses, credits, their grades, and ECTS-compatible grades.

English Foundation Course

The English Foundation Course has been designed for students who are already at a CEFR A2 level in English and wish to study at ELTE or another European university, but do not yet have the necessary level of language proficiency or study skills to pursue a BA degree programme. With a minimum of 800 contact hours guaranteed, the English Preparatory Year can bring students up to speed in as little as two semesters.

LANGUAGE IMPROVEMENT

This is the core element of the programme, with a general course in language improvement, focusing on the basic skills of speaking, writing, listening and reading. To prepare students to use English for study purposes, there are specialised courses in the accurate use of English grammar and vocabulary, academic reading and writing, and classes on the presentation and discussion skills needed for participation in seminars.

STUDY SKILLS

Our teachers are there to help, but students are expected to develop independent study skills for their future academic and professional career by attending courses designed to improve self-study skills, such as setting goals, managing time and monitoring progress. Teachers will also set assignments to be completed through individual study and advise about available resources.

CULTURAL STUDIES

It is impossible to use a language without understanding the culture that surrounds it. The programme includes courses on the major English-speaking cultures in the British Isles and North America. Other courses cover aspects of European culture in general, as well as the culture of the host country, Hungary.

GOALS

Students should be able to pass the CEFR B2 level language proficiency exam offered by the University at the end of the academic year. Passing the exam will gain students admission to ELTE's English and American Studies BA programmes, and programmes in other subjects taught in English. They may be admitted into another higher education institution of their choice in Hungary or the European Union depending on the language requirements of the other institution.

Hungarian Foundation Course

Specialising in Hungarian language teaching for foreigners, the National Centre for Hungarian offers cutting edge programmes to anyone interested in the Hungarian language and culture. The Hungarian General Language programme is the ideal way to jump-start your future academic or professional life in Hungary.

FIRST SEMESTER INTENSIVE COURSE

The course aims to equip students with the tools needed to successfully manage communicational situations arising in the target language environment, and to understand factual texts containing the basic structures of the language, in both reading and writing.

SECOND SEMESTER INTENSIVE COURSE

The course provides students with the full formal system of the Hungarian language. The course subjects, aimed at developing the various language skills, now concentrate on areas such as independent written compositions and language use for expressing opinions. The reading programme gradually leads from understanding texts with the help of a dictionary up to the independent processing of texts. The latter subjects can be expanded by developing the basic vocabulary according to the students' wishes into such areas as history, literature, sociology, etc.

The language proficiency acquired by the end of the course allows students to use the language for specific purposes, enabling them to continue their university studies or to use Hungarian as an intermediary language at work.

Doctoral programmes

We offer 70 accredited doctoral programmes in all fields of study within the humanities.

The diversity of the subjects that may be studied here makes the faculty a unique doctoral centre in the Central European region. The PhD programmes are organised into four doctoral schools.

Students work on their dissertation topic under the guidance of a supervisor, an established member of Hungarian and international academic life. The doctoral programmes aim to endow the students with the research methodology needed for an academic career, and help develop their qualities as teacher and researcher.

By fulfilling the publication requirements, students become part of international academic life. International agreements between universities and the diverse international academic relations of supervising teachers provide outstanding students with the opportunity to partake in foreign research programmes, or to complete their doctoral studies in a so-called Co-tutelle arrangement (double doctoral degree scheme). Doctoral schools frequently organise conferences, which serve as an excellent forum for talented students to present the results of their independent research, and to develop the academic skills indispensable for a future academic.

Research

ELTE's Faculty of Humanities actively takes part in national and international collaborations.

Talented students may participate in such projects in cooperation with their tutors.

The establishment of the research centres has allowed the Faculty to put its existing academic resources to use in an organised manner. The faculty promotes bi- and multilateral international educational and research collaboration with the region's and the world's leading higher education and research institutions. We strive to become a leading centre of humanities research within the Central European region.

The instructors of the faculty's 18 institutes regularly travel abroad and host their international colleagues at home. They regularly organise international academic conferences and, by sending their students abroad, ensure that the future generations of researchers and instructors receive high-level training with an international outlook. Our instructors foster personal working or consultative relationships with university tutors and research centre staff from 40 countries, many of whom are involved in the editorial processes of renowned international academic journals.

LIBRARIES IN THE SERVICE OF RESEARCH

in Hungary

Our library network - comprising the Central Reading Hall and the individual libraries of the various institutes – holds 1.2 million individual documents; a rarity not just in a domestic, but also in an international comparison, as only the most reputable institutions can boast such collections.

The faculty's imposing special collections, the works of its past professors and renowned academics, its private libraries, museum pieces (globally unique incunabula, manuscripts and records), its own periodicals (scientific journals, almanacs), doctoral dissertations, nontraditional documents (score sheets, photos) are indisputable treasures of Hungary's cultural heritage. Many of the faculty's collections also function as national reference libraries. In addition to providing traditional library services, the library network also helps enhance research and education at the faculty by providing access to the major humanities and social sciences article databases like JSTOR or ERIC.

COLLEGES FOR ADVANCED STUDIES

The oldest college for advanced studies is Eötvös József Collegium founded in 1895, whose history is closely tied to that of the faculty. Talented students can get here the chance to immerse themselves in the research of a field of their choosing beyond their university studies.

SCIENTIFIC STUDENTS' ASSOCIATIONS

All academic branches taught at the faculty have their own Scientific Students' Associations (in Hungarian TDK), which provide an organised framework for students' individual and group research activities. These associations give talented students the chance to conduct far more in-depth research activities than within their regular university studies and write and debate research papers under the supervision of teachers specialising in the given field. Students who put together the best papers get to take part in the biennial National Conference of Scientific Students' Associations. The best papers are published in the faculty's publications and scientific journals, helping their authors gain admission to a doctoral programme and to eventually become recognised figures in academic life.



TUTORING

Tutoring gives students a chance to take part in one-on-one study sessions with an instructor of their choosing, allowing for a more intensive and immersive exploration of the given subject matter

HONORATIOR STATUS

The honoratior status is the highest level of individual talent management. It entails taking on an additional minor or specialisation for a total of 50 credits free of charge beyond the mandatory minor or track comprising 180 credits.

In addition, the faculty has established the Student Excellence Scholarship through which the Master's programme student deemed the most outstanding among their peers is awarded significant financial support with a view to enhancing their academic activities and professional advancement.

— Did you know? —

As well as academic conferences, lectures, and roundtable discussions, most departments and institutes also organize their own events. These include the annual Slavic Spring and Christmas celebrations, the Advent concert, the St. Patrick's Day and Halloween parties hosted by the Institute of English and American Studies, the chanson evenings of the Institute of Romance Studies, or the Hungarian Department Day.

1. DEGREE PROGRAMME SELECTION

Prospective students can browse through the degree programmes that the Faculty of Humanities of ELTE offers in foreign languages to international applicants. Fees, deadlines, admission requirements, application procedures, and the entrance examination process are all specified separately for each degree programme, as they may differ depending on the academic level and field of study. 2. ONLINE APPLICATION AND ENTRANCE **EXAMINATION**

Applicants can easily arrange their online application. Once they have prepared their application, they should not forget to click on the "submit" button. They must also pay the application fee and the entrance exam fee. APPLY.ELTE.HU

3. LETTER OF ACCEPTANCE AND TUITION FEE

If the applicant meets the requirements and passes the entrance exam, they will receive the 'Letter of Acceptance' document in the online application system. Further information will be provided about how to pay the tuition fee and what needs to be arranged before arrival. If the applicant does not meet the admission requirements, they will be notified of the rejection of their application.

4. CONFIRMATION AND PRE-ARRIVAL **PREPARATION**

Once the applicant has received the 'Letter of Acceptance', they must confirm their decision in the online application system, indicating that they would like to enrol in the programme. At this stage, they should begin preparing for their stay in Budapest, Hungary, and learn more about practical matters such as housing, insurance, visas, and other important details.

Required English proficiency

All our mid-level programmes (bachelor and above) require applicants to submit proof of language proficiency.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS FOR BA AND MA PROGRAMME APPLICANTS

Every international student applying for an English-medium study programme (Bachelor-level or higher) must show proof of a certain level of English language proficiency.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY REQUIREMENTS FOR THE FOUNDATION COÙRSE IN ENGLISH

Recommended minimum level of English: A2 level of the CEFR (Common European Framework of Reference), i.e. a minimum of approximately 250 hours of previous studies.

For the Foundation Course in English, no language certificate is required, but meeting the above requirement is strictly the applicant's responsibility, as they will be asked to take a proficiency test at the beginning of their preparatory year. Should the student fail to meet this minimum requirement, they will not be able to follow the classes.

NATIVE SPEAKERS

Students from countries whose official (first or de jure) language is the language of tuition are exempt from the above language exam requirements. Instead of the required language certificates listed above, students must present an official, notarised document, stating that English has been the medium of their tuition throughout their high school and/or university studies.

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STIPENDIUM HUNGARICUM SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME

Hungarian universities and colleges attract thousands of international applicants each year. The number of Stipendium Hungaricum applicants as well as the number of available scholarship places are continuously on the rise. Every year, more than 5,000 students begin their studies in Hungary within the framework of the Stipendium Hungaricum Programme.

The programme is based on bilateral educational cooperation agreements signed between the ministries responsible for education in the sending countries/territories and Hungary or between institutions. Currently around 80 Sending Partners are engaged in the programme throughout 5 different continents and the geographical scope of the programme expands each year. For more information, visit:

Did you know?

There are dedicated mentors for Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship holders too. They assist with everyday problems, questions regarding your stay in Hungary, Budapest and at ELTE.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTION

What factors are considered when making admission decisions? You have better chances of being accepted if you received high grades (GPA) during your high school studies or an undergraduate (BA or BSc) degree with "excellent" or "good" qualifications (in accordance with the Hungarian higher education system).

What is the tuition fee? This depends on which programme you wish to follow. Information regarding tuition fees can be found on our website: BTK.ELTE.HU/EN

What is the deadline for paying my tuition fee? If you require a visa to come to Hungary, we strongly advise you transfer the fee to the university's account as soon as possible after receiving your letter of acceptance. The local Hungarian embassy or consulate is likely to issue your visa only if the tuition fee has been settled in advance. Please only transfer the tuition fee to the university's account after you have been accepted onto of our programmes. If you are a European Economic Area (EEA) national, the Faculty requires you to pay the tuition fee up to one semester in advance.

I am a citizen of an EEA state; do I require a visa to study in Hungary? No, you do not, but you might be required to apply for a registration card depending on the length of your stay. Citizens of states belonging to the European Economic Area (EEA) are entitled to enter the territory of the Hungarian Republic in possession of a valid identity card or passport and are allowed to stay for up to 90 days, without any special authorisation. EEA citizens planning to stay for more than 90 days in Hungary must apply for a registration card.

Where can I find out more about the legal requirements I have to comply with? Many of the instructions for obtaining a visa and residence permit (only for non-EEA nationals), or any other documents needed while staying in Hungary, can be found on our website: BTK.ELTE.HU/EN. However, we strongly recommend that you should always inquire with the Hungarian authorities in order to make sure that you have the latest and most up-to-date information. The National Directorate-General for Aliens Policing (OIF) is responsible for most procedures that non-Hungarian nationals have to follow when they wish to study in Hungary.

The staff of the Department of International Affairs (DIA) organise events and provide information to international students about the campus and community. University life and services for international students

ORIENTATION DAYS

These events are designed to introduce the University, staff and organisations that newly admitted students will be in contact with. The information and advice gleaned from the orientation sessions help students to adjust to the learning environment of the University and to living in Budapest.

LET'S LEARN LANGUAGES!

ELTE offers Hungarian and English language courses to its international students during their studies at the University. Courses are available at different levels. The type and level of courses depend on the demand of applicants for the given semester.

MENTOR SYSTEM

ELTE provides personal mentoring before arrival and/or during their stay in Budapest.

ELTE ERASMUS STUDENT NETWORK (ESN)

One of the biggest interdisciplinary student associations in Europe with 13,500 active members. ESN organizes events and create a friendly and safe atmosphere among students. The ESN student card provides special discounts.

SPORTS AT ELTE

The sporting life of ELTE is organised around two major ideas: courses offered by University Athletics Club (BEAC), and sports courses for credit. There are plenty of sporting opportunities at our university, including swimming, basketball, cheerleading and hiking.

HELP PROGRAMME

The HELP programme is a new scheme designed to help students achieve academic goals during their studies by providing information and a supportive learning environment. During your time at the University, you may experience personal and emotional issues that impact on your academic work and university life. The counselling services at ELTE offer free and confidential support to students to help them develop ways of overcoming difficulties.

IT SUPPORT

All ELTE campuses provide free wi-fi access for ELTE students.

HELP FOR DIFFERENTLY ABLED STUDENTS

The University's Disability Centre is responsible for providing direct and indirect services to any ELTE citizens, including international students and staff. You are not alone with your difficulties.

ACCOMODATION OPTIONS

Students can choose ELTE dormitories or look for private accommodation. Those who would like to stay in an ELTE dormitory during their studies should apply using the online registration form provided by the Dormitory Centre and the Housing Office.

Eötvös Loránd University is located in the very heart of Budapest. 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
